



RESILIENCE and RECONCILIATION Democracy in Crisis and Repair across History

Gerjan Borneman

MA Gerjan Borneman is a historian working at the intersection of ancient history and political philosophy, with a particular interest in democracy and resistance in Classical Athens. His MA thesis at the University of Groningen, on the (absence of) civil disobedience in Classical Athens, focused on applying modern political and moral philosophy to ancient historical cases. Borneman conducted research during his stay at the Netherlands Institute at Athens and gained research experience as a research assistant on a project examining interconnectivity in Hellenistic sport festivals under the supervision of Prof. Onno van Nijf.

Nuno Grancho

Dr. Nuno Grancho is an architect, urban planner, architectural historian and theorist who works at the intersection of research on architecture, urbanism, material culture and colonial practices from the early 16th century to the present. He earned his PhD in Architecture and Urbanism at the University of Coimbra in 2017, and also studied at the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London. Grancho has held post-doctoral positions at the University Institute of Lisbon, the University of Copenhagen, the Royal Danish Academy in Copenhagen and the University of Massachusetts. He has also taught at the School of Architecture, Design and Conservation at the Royal Danish Academy in Copenhagen. Grancho is currently affiliated member of the Indian Ocean World Centre (IOWC) at McGill University in Montreal and an affiliated scholar at the Centre for Privacy Studies, University of Copenhagen.

Edward M. Harris

Prof. Edward M. Harris is Professor Emeritus of Ancient History at Durham University and Honorary Professorial Fellow at the University of Edinburgh. He has published extensively on political history, democracy, the economy, law and institutions in ancient Greece, and has also translated ancient Greek texts. Harris' publication record includes the monographs *Aeschines and Athenian Politics* (Oxford University Press 1995), *Democracy and the Rule of Law in Classical Athens* (Cambridge University Press 2006), *The Rule of Law in Action in Democratic Athens* (Oxford University Press 2013), and co-edited volumes including *The Law and the Courts in Ancient Greece* (Duckworth 2004), *The Ancient Greek Economy: Markets, Households, and City-States* (Cambridge University Press 2016), *Skilled Labor and Professionalism in the Greek and Roman Worlds* (Cambridge University Press 2020), *The Destruction of Cities in the Ancient Greek World* (Cambridge University Press 2021), *Keeping to the Point: Law, Character and Rhetoric in Athenian Forensic Oratory* (Edinburgh University Press 2025), as well as numerous articles in academic periodicals and edited collections.



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Antonio Iacoviello

Dr. Antonio Iacoviello works on the entanglement between the materiality and textuality of memory addressing the cultural, political, and institutional history of ancient Greece, with particular focus on early Hellenistic Athens, Attic oratory and epigraphy. He is currently an Alexander von Humboldt Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Mannheim and Visiting Fellow at the Deutsches Archäologische Institut in Athens (spring 2026). After receiving his PhD from the University of Edinburgh in 2022, Iacoviello held postdoctoral positions at the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales in Paris and at the University of Trento. He is the author of the forthcoming monograph *The Legacy of the Attic Orators in Early Hellenistic Athens: Rhetoric, Democracy, and the Politics of Memory* (Oxford University Press) and co-editor of the forthcoming volume *Hellenistic Democracy: Shapes and Models of Popular Power in the Greek Poleis* (Edinburgh University Press).

Daniel Kawecki

Dr. Daniel Kawecki is a postdoctoral researcher at the Åbo Akademi University in Finland and a member of the BEHAVE research group at the University of Helsinki. He earned his PhD in 2025 from the University of Helsinki with a thesis on the mechanisms of affective polarization in Finland. Kawecki is currently working in the project EmoAffect at Åbo Akademi, where he studies affective political polarization among the Swedish speaking population in Finland, and will soon move to the University of Helsinki to join a project examining ethnolinguistic political mobilization. He is also affiliated with the RESLIDE project, which investigates the resilience of liberal democracy in Finland and is funded by the Finnish Strategic Research Council.

Güldeniz Kıbrıs

Dr. Güldeniz Kıbrıs is a historian of modern Turkey specializing in political culture, nationalism, and cinema, with a particular focus on the Cold War period. Her work lies at the intersection of cultural history, film and media studies, and diplomatic history. Kıbrıs received her PhD in Turkish Studies from Leiden University with a thesis analyzing nationalist mythmaking in Turkish cinema from the 1950s to the 1980s. She has published on Yeşilçam cinema, Cold War culture, migration, and the representation of war and gender, and is currently developing projects on democratic crisis and cultural repair, conceptual history, and audiovisual historiography. Kıbrıs has taught courses on modern Turkish history, Cold War politics, and cinema at both undergraduate and graduate levels.



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Despoina Kotsi

Despoina Kotsi is a Doctor of Public Law. She studied at the Athens Law School (NKUA) and Montesquieu University Law School in Bordeaux, specializing in educational law and in international law and diplomatic studies. Kotsi works as Lawyer in Athens and practices before the Supreme Court, primarily on issues of public law and public contracts. Her research interests focus on mechanisms for controlling state authority, the exercise of foreign policy and the benefits arising from the EU acquis. The protection of vulnerable social groups, especially children, and the pursuit of social concord have underpinned her writings throughout her career. Kotsi has received several distinctions in nationwide literary competitions.

Jorunn Økland

Prof. Jorunn Økland is a biblical scholar and specialist in Gender Studies with a background in Classics. She is Professor of Gender Studies at the University of Oslo. Her areas of expertise include Pauline Studies, ancient Mediterranean material culture, feminist critique of religion, gender and sacred texts, Bible translations, and cultural/secular uses of the Bible. In addition to her work at the University of Oslo Økland has taught at the University of Sheffield and worked as the Director of the Norwegian Institute at Athens. She holds several positions of academic trust, including membership of the Norwegian Academy of Science and Letters and as the Chair of the Translation Committee of the Norwegian Bible Society. Økland's publications include the monograph *Women in Their Place: Paul and the Corinthian Discourse of Gender and Sanctuary Space*. (Bloomsbury 2005) and the co-edited volume *Constructions of Space III: Biblical Spatiality and the Sacred* (Bloomsbury 2016), as well as numerous articles in periodicals and edited volumes.

Dag Petersson

Dr. Dag Petersson is Associate Professor of philosophy, science theory and architectural theory at the Royal Danish Academy. He is co-founder of the International Master's Program 'Political Architecture: Critical Sustainability'. Petersson's research focuses on architecture, temporalities and the political theory of Hannah Arendt. He is the author of *The Art of Reconciliation* (Palgrave MacMillan 2015), *The Making of the Other Half: Jacob Riis and the Mutation of Tenement Poverty* (Aarhus University Press 2015) and *Delisted: A Political Story* (Danish Architectural Press, 2023).



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Sanna Salo

Dr. Sanna Salo is a Senior Researcher at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs (FIIA). She earned her PhD in 2017 from the European University Institute in Florence and has held positions at the universities of Maastricht, Stockholm and Helsinki. Salo's academic work focuses on the responses of centrist Western European parties to the far right, including its transnational connections and implications for liberal democracy. Salo is currently working for two projects: RESLIDE, which examines the resilience of liberal democracy in Finland and is funded by the Finnish Strategic Research Council, and a project on the strategies of center-right parties and the radical right in Sweden, Finland and Germany, funded by the Kone Foundation.

Rogier van der Wal

Dr. Rogier van der Wal studied Classics and Philosophy at the Vrije Universiteit in Amsterdam and completed his PhD on Cicero's *De finibus bonorum et malorum*. He is currently Lecturer in Ethical Working at the Fontys University of Applied Sciences in the Netherlands, where he leads research on the ethical aspects of work and organizational morality. Van der Wal also holds an MA in Public Administration and, alongside his work in Classics, has served as Director at the Expertise Centre for Disability & Study in Utrecht and gained extensive experience as a policy adviser in public administration. He has translated Latin authors into Dutch, and his research interests include ethical leadership, practical wisdom, moresprudence, ethics and citizenship education and the ethics of the future.

Alexandra Vasilou

MA Alexandra Vasilou holds a BA in Theology and an MA in the History of Religions at the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens, with a specialization in Islam. Her academic work focuses on Islamic theology and history, with particular attention to Islam in Europe and the Middle East, as well as contemporary geopolitical developments in the region. Vasilou is currently a Junior Researcher at the Centre for Mediterranean, Middle Eastern and Islamic Studies (CEMMIS) and an External Associate at the Interdisciplinary Laboratory for Black Sea and Mediterranean Studies (ILABSEM).

Triantafyllos Zacharakis

Dr. Triantafyllos Zacharakis earned his PhD from the University of Thessaly with the thesis "The Federal States (Koina) of Thessaly: Federalism in the region of Thessaly during the Late Hellenistic Period and the Imperial Era (2nd c. BC–3rd c. AD)". He holds a master's degree in Translation of political, legal, and economic texts from the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens. Zacharakis has recently taught ancient history as an Adjunct Lecturer at the Department of History and Archaeology at the University of Ioannina. His research interests include ancient Greek history, federal states and Greek epigraphy.
